

#### SENIOR WARDEN

This year has reminded us in so many ways of the strength and closeness of our community. Even when we are unable to gather in person, the Spirit keeps us together, connecting us. Many in the media or in our society kept referring to our churches as "closed," but we were never closed. We continued following the Gospel call to live in love with our neighbors, finding ever new ways to seek and serve Christ in all people.

I want to remind us of the many ways in which our ministries have pressed on during this time, and through which the generosity and strength of your spirit is consistently made clear.

- St. Luke's did not miss a beat in taking up the charge to put church online and ever improve upon the technological processes keeping us together via Zoom.
- We had four book studies deepening our connections with each other and providing time for personal growth.
- EYC made every effort to stay connected via Zoom and safely resume meetings. All our teens are back and happy to be together again.
- Pantry recognized the local needs and doubled down on food and communication efforts providing 5-6 bags of groceries per family every 2 weeks in our most critical months. The St. Luke's pantry is now monthly serving 30% more families in need than this time last year. Many volunteers continue to give their time and effort and willingly serve to meet Scottsboro's needs. We are so thankful for the specific donations that continue to come in.
- We have several parishioners who faithfully serve the community monthly through Meals on Wheels.
- The parish hall is now in regular use by the ARC of Jackson County and the weekly women's painting club. Family Wellness Court also uses our parish hall for teaching and ceremonies.
- Our cleaning team has done an incredible job deep cleaning and keep our facilities up to Covid standards.
- Daughters of the King have faithfully reached out and held our needs in prayer.
- Body Mind and Spirit reflective yoga class via zoom & YouTube aired twice a week for multiple months and plans to begin again in February this year.
- We held the community outreach service of Blessing of the Animals hosting many first-time guests.
- The basement is cleared, cleaned, and back in weekly use by AA looking brighter than ever.
- Our church has grown during this time of pandemic with new members physically as well as online.
- We continue our Sunday worship with occasional Eucharist, and our Wednesday evening prayer services are live on Facebook. Christian formation continues along with Godly Play online in collaboration with other Northeast Alabama churches.

Our ministries are alive and well. There is much to look forward to. The Lord is still working! Amen! Most of all, all this speaks to the love we bear for each other and the world around us. As we look to the year to come, we are more committed than ever to the ministry and love we share with our community and our neighbors.

# JUNIOR WARDEN

This has been a busy year for the Junior Warden. Our buildings and grounds must be maintained while staying on budget so we can return to normal activities after the interruption

from COVID. I would like to give special thanks for the advice and work of all my committee members: Danny Bridges, Paul Holland, Tony Loop, and Rob Robb. Danny has already confronted most of the problems faced by this Junior Warden, and his advice and help have allowed me to have some success in this role. Rob Robb seems to be able to fix most anything, which has allowed us to keep up with most of the problems that occur. Also, Polly was very helpful with her advice and counseling when some of the problems of this job seemed insurmountable. A brief description of some of our accomplishments will follow in the report.

The property behind the playground received a makeover. It consisted of cutting and the removal of several trees, trimming trees that extended beyond our property, fence cleaning (mostly by hand), removal of debris in the ditch on our western property edge, hauling away three loads of debris after we reached the max allowed for free City pickup, and two rounds of heavy duty bush hogging with a skid steer. The playground and our grounds benefited from a dump truck load of much-needed mulch donated by Tony Loop and the Millers.

The irrigation systems were fixed. Water no longer comes up in the parking lot cracks as the leaks were repaired allowing enough pressure in the system, so it works again with automatic control. The massive leak on the eastern side was repaired and it can now be manually controlled. Special thanks to Danny and Rob for their help on this project. An added benefit of these repairs was the removal and replacement of a large piece of sidewalk that had been drastically altered by roots and had become dangerous on this much-traveled area.

We had a huge mold problem above the alter rails. This was rectified by the work of Everett, Melody, and Jared.

The urinal in the restroom was repaired and flushes once again.

Rob and Danny replaced a kitchen light and fixed the blemish in the ceiling caused by a water leak. Rick Whitehead fixed a problem with the boot on the roof and donated his services to the church.

Rob and Danny installed a new LED light in the office.

Polly and Rob installed drain extensions to reduce the basement water problem. In addition, we had the leaves and accumulated debris removed from the north basement windows. This seems to have solved the problem *for now*. As you may know, this has been a recurring problem for many years.

I hope you have noticed an improvement in the appearance of our church grounds. This is due to the hard work of Victor Ortez, our new grounds person. He has kept the grounds clean during the autumnal season, which is a considerable task. Please notice the southeastern area of our grounds. Victor has removed the privet and made this area beautiful again. The same diligence has been demonstrated all over the church grounds. Polly and I are pleased with his work so far, and we expect to see the same as the seasons progress.

Please check out our new "nice and clean" ice maker. Special thanks to Polly for the ice maker research and providing the impetus for this project; to Melody, Everett, and Jared who helped me unload it from my truck and place it safely in Bradford Hall; to Tim and Danny for removing the old one and to Johnny Cantrell for cleaning the resultant mess; and to Margie for helping me chase the 53 foot trailer to the industrial park so I could transfer it to my truck.

Although it is impossible for me to predict problems, I do have a concern for 2021. I will closely monitor the air conditioning for Bradford Hall. The double HVAC system on the west side of Bradford Hall is very old. One unit quit working several years ago. We were able to finish the warm weather with a relatively cheap fix to the single functioning unit. This fix may last months or years, so we must be ready to replace the units when the time comes. I have discussed this with my committee and the vestry, procured estimates and have received helpful financial advice for paying for the new system from Charles Heath. I believe we will be able to fix this problem if or when it happens.

Please let me know if you see a problem that is in the purview of grounds and maintenance.

Inquiry Classes began in November with three persons working toward Confirmation and two persons desiring to reaffirm their baptismal vows. We met on Zoom, studied the catechism, the sacraments, and we met in person for an instructed Eucharist. The two young persons joined another confirmation class in a weekend retreat at Camp McDowell in November, which Polly heped teach. While the bishop was unable to be here for confirmation, she will schedule a time in 2021 to come to St. Luke's and make this happen.

While we were uncertain how to proceed with formation, we found lots of opportunity. Teaching and learning is a complete joy of mine, part of who God created me to be. So, when I read the canon above on the duty of the rector, I see this "duty" as a wonder and delight and am looking forward to continuing in whatever ways we can.

### MEALS ON WHEELS

St. Luke's has participated in the county Meals on Wheels program for at least the past 15 years. The MOW program is run by the Scottsboro/Jackson County Senior Center. There are currently four routes with from 10 to 12 recipients on each route. Meals are delivered every weekday except for holidays. The recipients (clients) of MOW are adults who are homebound (i.e., disabled and unable to leave their homes except perhaps for medical appointments.

Of course, like other aspects of our lives, MOW has been different in 2020 due to COVID limitations. We have not been called on to deliver regularly. Volunteers were not utilized at all for several months during this year. Most recently, boxes of ready-to-eat food were delivered biweekly by either the Senior Center staff or volunteers.

In "ordinary times," St. Luke's is responsible for one of the four routes, approximately one week out of every month. It takes about one hour to pick up meals from the Senior Center, deliver them, and return the empty containers to the Center. Volunteers are welcome!

During 2020, our volunteers were: Danny Bridges, Deborah Butler (new volunteer!!), Nancy Gauldin, Marilyn and Richard Olcott, Shirley and Jerry Rossano, and Charles and Barbara Heath. Thanks to our team for their cooperation and faithfulness!!

As clerk, I also signed or attested to required certain reports, such as the parochial report, submitted to the diocese.

I appreciate the opportunity to serve the vestry and St. Luke's as clerk and am willing to assist the vestry or the rector, as I can.

#### MEMORIAL COMMITTEE

St. Luke's Memorial Committee has had limited activity this year. Our balance in the Memorial Fund as of January 1, 2020, was \$10,928.23.

During 2020, we had memorial donations of \$525.00, which were acknowledged appropriately at the time of donation. New cards were printed which are sent to the donor, and to the family representative if the donation is for a specific person (cost of printing \$98.10). Our priest noted that a green stole, matching other green vestments, was quite worn and needed to be replaced. Ann Moody offered to donate this stole from the Memorial Funds given in memory

of her husband Donald Moody, and this purchase was carried out (cost of \$272.80).

Our balance as of 12-31-2020 is \$10,782.33.

Nancy Gauldin has agreed to serve as a member of the Memorial Committee, to replace Rhonda Hess. The Memorial Committee hopes to meet regularly in 2021, once the COVID restrictions are removed.

#### FINANCE COMMITTEE

Finance Committee members are Danny Bridges, Charles Heath, Janet Sage and Polly Robb.

Unfortunately, we lost long-time member Henry Cannon. The Committee meets periodically to review the monthly parish financial reports prepared by Deb Miller. Each month the Vestry is given a status briefing with charts which illustrate trends in giving and spending. This process is intended to help the Vestry understand both individual income and expense items and our overall financial condition so they can anticipate problems and take advantage of opportunities. In November the Committee prepares a draft budget for the next year derived from current year spending and anticipated giving (pledges, Sunday plate, donations, rental income, etc.). This budget is discussed and updated by the Vestry and presented for approval at the annual meeting. Committee members are glad to assist any parishioner in understanding our financial procedures and status.

Financially 2020 was a solid year with our assets (cash and investments) rising from \$328,422 to \$357,073 (\$28,651). Our income included \$26,200 of COVID relief funds. Due to reduced

utility bills and other activity-related expenses we underspend by \$11,022 our \$185,391 budget. The Committee has recommended a deficit budget of \$183,926 versus estimated \$144,500 income (which does not include investment growth or receiving applied-for COVID grants). As in past years, we anticipate growth in parish membership, attendance and commitment.

#### **FOOD PANTRY**

First of all, thank you for the opportunity to serve through the pantry.

It took many hands and generous donors to make the pantry operate smoothly this year. St. Luke's designated 4K of the budget for the 2020 pantry year. Due to the great need arising from the economic fallout of the pandemic, we asked and were gifted additional donations of over \$8,500 from those in and outside the parish. In addition, St. Luke's applied for and received a CARES grant late in the year (\$8,000 of which goes directly to our pantry), allowing us to continue the increase to our pantry offerings in the coming year.

Typically, we hold our pantry on the first Saturday of the month. On average the monthly cost is now \$900, up from \$333 planned before the pandemic. The increased amount purchases 5-7 bags per household and we serve on average 50 families a month; in December 2020, we were able to serve 60 families. That means we packed over 400 bags of groceries! In between pantry dates, guests can seek the office for help with groceries and we stock the blue hutch to serve folks after hours as well.

I am hugely grateful for all the volunteers that make this happen. With the closing of CASA earlier this year and the economic hardships related to Covid Scottsboro has needed you to step up and you did. We had 36 volunteers in total this year from in & outside of St. Luke's. In June while Polly and other ministers connected through the prayer walk, we had opportunity to reach out to the AME church and expanded our clientele. We also had free ads printed in the Clarion that got the word out about our pantry. We continue to seek ways to improve advertising. We have applied to the North Alabama Food Bank to be a donation site of theirs, and are awaiting inspection and approval. This past year we received harvest donations from local farmers, had farm fresh eggs donated, gladly accepted donations from Patrick's meat market and discounted packaging from Bruce's Foodland. The manager at Walmart is now coordinating a special curbside pickup for us to keep our parishioners safer. We've included special seasonal items each month and all our newcomers get a flyer inviting them to join us online. The addition this fall of the ARC of Jackson county's assistance with packing has been a Godsend. I am extremely grateful for their work. It is on point!

The EYC assisted with November and December pantry distribution and we plan for their quarterly participation in 2021. If you are seeking ways to work out your faith and can offer up a Saturday morning contact me Melody Reed 410-980-0615. We mask and sanitize. # MISSIONS & OUTREACH

The past year has been a challenge for our outreach programs. With Melody taking the lead and Stan doing much of the purchasing the Food Pantry has had a banner year.

Donations of cash and food have made it possible to provide food and necessary non-food for approximately fifty families each month. Volunteers were there to assemble the nine grocery bags provided. Recently we have had a group of volunteers from the ARC of Jackson County to assist in packaging the food.

When not packaging food Saint Luke's has provided a venue for people from The ARC to gather and make cards for people in nursing homes, currently they are making valentines.

In the next year I hope we can find the resources to support the Jackson County Children's Advocacy Center. Further I would hope we can find help to alleviate the problem of recidivism.

With the pandemic, any world missions trips were postponed. We hope to once again be able to join in the TEC's commitment to serving those in need outside our own community once we are able to travel.
